Two days later I gave another plant tour to a group of seniors from a local church. As we walked and talked about the plant, people, and environment I quickly realized just how often I have taken for granted the work that we do. These members of the public were awe struck at the amount of water we treat and the low cost to treat it all. I talked to them about the many players involved with operating a treatment plant and with the efforts of putting together a big project like the one we are embarking upon. It takes a lot of people doing a lot of things day in and day out to fight the good fight for our water environment.

Looking back on the two tours I was reminded of two simple facts; people who work in this field really like it, and to the unaccustomed eye what we do is like magic.

## Musings from the Editor...



Well, this is my second article this month... no, you were not given the opportunity to read the first; I was advised that the first was 'a bit too far out there'. So... we'll see how this one goes.

I wonder how many of us seek to follow those ancient philosophical words: Know Thyself. I wonder if we even know what this entails. To me, to 'know myself', transcends the mind and the ego. Okay, what does all this mean? I guess what it means is that there are forces within us that cause us to act and think in certain ways. Forces that we often don't understand. Or we think we understand, but it may only be a superficial understanding.

What drives us, really? What drives you to become an Operator V? Or an engineer or a supervisor or a utility worker? I bet many of us would say... "well, it's a living." Or, "my skills are well suited for this." How many of us would say... "I'm a manager because I am insecure in myself and therefore my ego needs that external proof that says I'm important." How many of us would say... "I'm a utility worker because my father always ridiculed me and my capabilities and now I don't have faith in myself." Very few, I would guess.

It's an extremely difficult task to "Know Thyself". Because what it involves is looking at those things about us that we don't particularly like to look at. That we don't particularly like about ourselves. That we don't want to admit about ourselves.

But... just think if we were willing to do this. Just think how much less 'blame' there would be, how much less victimhood, how much less strife in our every day encounters. If I could face that part of me that is insecure, then, when I lash out at someone for questioning my authority (for example), I can understand that it is only because of my insecurity that I'm lashing out. And, perhaps, next time, I'll realize this BEFORE I lash out, before I cause harm to another person. If I can understand this, then I have the opportunity to move into taking responsibility for myself, my words, and my actions. And, hopefully, be less likely to blame someone else for my own so-called shortcomings.

You know, if we can take off the labels of judgment; the good/bad, right/wrong, we are freed to explore the aspects of ourselves that are difficult to admit. Being insecure is not good or bad... it is just a thing. It is just an aspect that resides in all of us. It's what we DO with that insecurity, how we compensate for it, how we relate to it that is important.

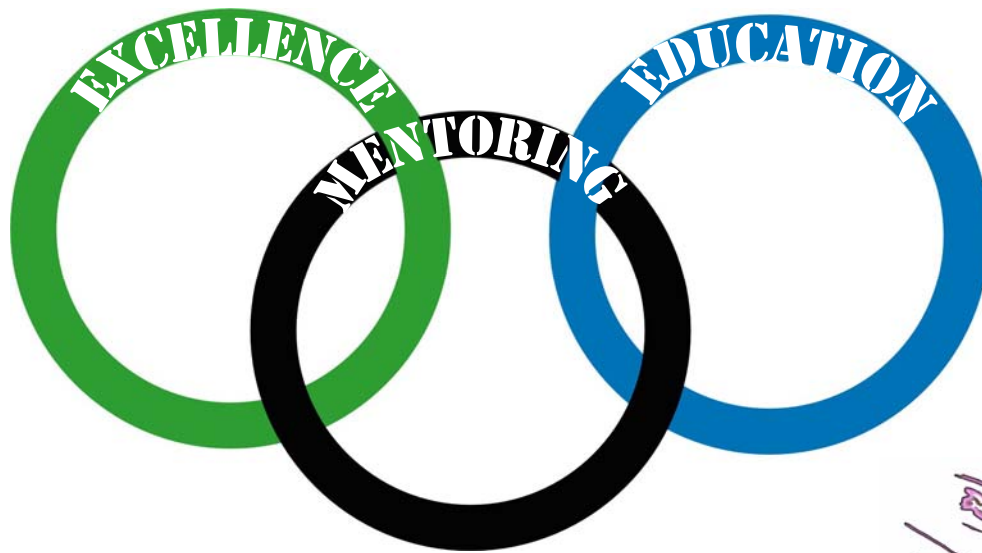

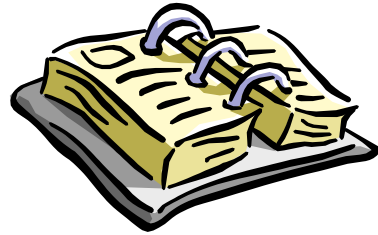


**TIME TO APPRECIATE
